### TREASURER'S REPORT

On behalf of the Finance Committee and Board of Directors, I am pleased to present the Financial Overview of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peel (BBBSP) for the year ended December 31, 2018. The enclosed 2018 Financial Overview provides a summary of BBBSP's financial position. A full set of the audited financial statements is available upon request.

We faced a very challenging year in 2018 with funding tightening while the demands for our services continued to increase. The change in provincial government in mid-2018 lead to some uncertainty in program funding that we had relied on for a number of years. In order to fulfil the commitments that we had made to our children and youth, we continued operating our programs through to their completion. In the end our 2018 expenses exceeded revenue by \$65,701.

In 2018 we continued our growth trajectory, increasing our net revenue base to \$2,245,000 with 58% received from grants, 15% from fundraising events and 27% from donations and other sources. We increased our program offerings from prior years which lead to our budgeted increase in operating expenses increased, totaling \$2,311,000 for the year. During 2018 we continued our efforts to optimize operating expenses to ensure that our resources are invested in the programs that have the greatest benefit to our stakeholders.

In reaction to the recent decreases in government and other funding sources, in 2019 we have taken necessary steps to restructure our operations to maintain the strength of our programming and financial stability. After much analysis and deliberation we determined that these changes in team structure and program put us in the best position to fulfil our vision and mission now and into the future. Thank you to our amazing team for their understanding and support through this process.

I would like to extend a sincere thank you to all our funders, corporate sponsors, foundations and individuals who have so generously contributed to support BBBSP - a full listing is included in the Annual Report. The continuing support of the United Way Greater Toronto, Region of Peel, Johnston Equipment, TD Financial Group and Brampton Multicultural Centre along with funding from the Ontario Ministry of Education, Immigration, Refugees & Citizenship Canada, the Ministry of Citizenship & Immigration and the Ministry of Children, Community & Social Services are critical to our continued success. In addition, we appreciate the many other businesses and individuals who support our vision that children and youth will realize their full potential through the power of mentoring.

Finally, thank you to the dedicated management, staff, volunteers, Board and committee members who are committed to building a brighter future for the over 2,000 children and youth that we serve.
