As a result, more young people have benefited from the guidance and support of a mentor, helping them build confidence, develop essential life skills, and achieve their goals.

TREASURER'S REPORT

On behalf of the Finance Committee and Board of Directors, I am pleased to present the Financial Overview of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peel York (BBBSPY) including revenue, expenses and the overall financial health of our organization for the year ended December 31, 2023. The enclosed 2023 Financial Overview provides a summary of BBBSPY's financial position. A full set of the audited financial statements is available upon request.

Revenue for BBBSPY consists of donations, grants, fundraising activities and other income. This year revenue totaled \$2,749,000 which is a decrease of \$102,000 from 2022. BBBSPY received generous donations from individuals, corporations and foundations totaling \$789,000 in 2023. These contributions are vital in supporting programs and initiatives aimed at empowering youth through mentorship. BBBSPY secured several grants from government agencies and private institutions totaling \$1,570,000 for 2023. These grants allow the Organization to expand reach and implement innovative programs to serve the youth in Peel and York. Fundraising Events, including gala, golf, bowl/move for kids sake and Bingo were successful in 2023 totaling \$370,000. These events help to raise awareness about the BBBSPY mission while engaging the community to support the cause.

Expenses for BBBSPY totaled \$2,940,000 for the year which is a slight decrease of \$45,000 from 2022. Most expenses were allocated to program activities aimed to achieve the mission of the organization.

BBBSPY finished the year with expenses exceeding revenues by \$191,000. Despite having expenses exceed revenues in the year, the overall financial position remains strong with assets in excess of liabilities of \$610,000. The cash reserves are sufficient to support ongoing operations and strategic initiatives.

I'd like to express my gratitude and appreciation to management, staff, volunteers, board and committee members. You continue to go above and beyond to keep the organization strong and serve the children in our communities.

A special thank you to funders, corporate sponsors, foundations and individuals who continue to provide their generous support to help the organization continue to serve the children in our communities with the power of mentoring.


Our mentors provide guidance and friendship to help to ignite the power and potential of young people in our community. The benefits we see in children and youth within our mentoring programs include: increased social-emotional competence, improved mental health and wellbeing, and enhanced educational engagement and employment readiness.

COMMITMENT

BBBSPY is committed to creating an inclusive environment where all members of the community feel safe and respected.

The diversity of Peel and York Regions are reflected and represented by the children, youth, and families we serve, our volunteers, staff and Board of Directors. This includes ethnocultural backgrounds, socio-economic status, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, gender, ability, and family dynamic.

Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Peel York is committed to providing programs and services that are accessible and responsive to diverse groups and unique individual needs.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS 2023

In 2023 there were 1,773 youth served with 246 in Community-Based 1:1 Programs, 368 in School-Based 1:1 Programs and 1,159 in Group Programs. This was made possible through 819 dedicated mentors. Of the youth served in our programs 83% were from racialized groups.



We are thrilled to announce the introduction of **Wellness Warriors** that was designed in response to emerging community needs and ongoing requests from our school board partners. This inclusive group mentoring program welcomes youth with any gender identity and expression. Wellness Warriors has a unique emphasis on mental, social, and physical well-being. Activities and discussions are centered around core concepts such as dealing with stress, social media, interpersonal relationships, and physical activity. The content was designed to reach young people aged 11-14. However, activities can be adapted to better suit older and younger demographics, and those with exceptionalities.

The goal of Wellness Warriors is to create a warm, welcoming environment where children of all gender identities can collaborate to gain a better understanding of their own social, mental, and physical well-being. While building social-emotional competencies that support interpersonal connection, advocacy, problem solving, positive self-esteem, and a sense of belonging.

FUNDRAISING AND COMMUNITY INITIATIVE HIGHLIGHTS

Tim Hortons Move For Kids' Sake - \$107,500 raised! We were fortunate to have a successful MFKS fundraiser in February May 2023 that got participants moving and active in support of our youth. Highlights include Peel Regional Police raising \$46,000 and Chief Nishan Duraiappah being Honorary Chairperson of our event.

The BIG Tee Off Golf Tournament - \$73,800 gross raised! On June 20th Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peel York had total of 150 golfers participate to help make our 2023 BIG Tee Off Event a huge success.

'BE BIG SHINE BRIGHT' Gala Celebration - \$90,000 gross raised! On September 22nd guests enjoyed a wonderful meal at the Pearson Convention Centre, entertainment and an awards presentations of our most outstanding volunteers, donors and community partners.

An additional 47 of our families were provided a turkey dinner courtesy of The Kitchen at Mono Mills.
